
San Beda is almost there, and we hope this issue informs the Bedan community that as an academic institution, we are destined to face the bright future.

has raised the bar of excellence. San Beda Seven years ago, this institution, like any other educational institu-

tions, confronted a number of challenges as it situates itself in the new educational milieu while preparing for the opportunities and threats of the ASEAN Integration and the introduction of the K+12 in the basic education curricula. Simply put, San Beda was head-to-head with the fastchanging demands of tertiary education. Seven years after, San Beda has gone far, ready to endure and soar higher.

Instrumental to this leap is the visionary leadership of Reverend Father Aloysius Ma. A. Maranan, O.S.B., who is now on his second term of office as Rector-President of the College since his first appointment in 2010. However, for Fr. Aloy, he attributes whatever success the institution has today to the concerted efforts of the Bedan community—the Benedictine fathers, Board of Trustees, school administrators, faculty, office personnel, students and alumni.

When asked during an interview what his formula was, he blurted, "Begin with the end in mind." He believes that if the end goal is clearly defined at the onset, a leader can best provide the direction to achieve the goal. For him, the Benedictine charism and the long established institutional vision and mission serve as his guiding principle.

In seven years:

landscape especially for the K+12 transition in the basic education curricula and the ASEAN Integration. Considering the seamless continuum of basic education and higher education, administrators, faculty members and students were provided with enough opportunities to enhance their expertise further, attend local and international seminars and conferences, and present research outputs as a way of strengthening their engagement and participation especially in the global arena.

2. It stood at par with peer colleges and universities as evidenced by the receipt of the Level 3 Accreditation of the Philippine Accreditation Association of Schools, Colleges and Universities (PAASCU), the likely reason for the marked increase of our enrollment in 2014. Despite the decline in the number of first year students in our undergraduate programs due to K+12 implementation, the number of our enrollees did not really lag behind the previous years' statistics. Now, San Beda is bidding for a university status to move further in its commitment 'to Christian formation as its service to the Church, the Philippine society and the world'. Moreover, it has opened four new competitive programs—the AB Political Science, AB English, AB Literature, and BS in Physical Education, major in Sports Wellness Management. All of these are done 'to reinforce the school's reputation as a leading school for law, accountancy, entrepreneurship and liturgy.'

3. It started several academic reforms which include 'the creation of the Academic Council, the highest policy making body on matters of quality assurance, thematic research agenda, faculty rank, tenure, and promotion and the requisite submission of each department or division's 5-year development plan. The portfolio of professional chairs has been extended.' Research grants and scholarships and the

growth of international and national conferences have been evident as well. There was a vigorous execution of community and outreach programs to and with our partner communities, agencies, and institutions which has already reached a total of 231 partnerships since 2010 until today. This includes the 3-year Social Enterprise and Economic Development (SEED) Program in the Philippines, initiated by the Office of Linkages and International Affairs, which engages students, faculty members, and community leaders in building sustainable businesses or projects for the community. Our College Library has continuously boosted its collection since 2013 up to the present with new acquisitions, totaling to 12,875. In addition, new offices were created to better the school's operation and service to its stakeholders. Last is the institution's aggressive drive towards internationalization. With the school's desire to step up efforts to meet the demands of the tertiary education and be able to provide opportunities for both the students and faculty members to participate in the global conversation in the global setting, it has started with its initial step in achieving the International Standards Organization (ISO) Certification, which when achieved would signify that the institution has passed the quality management standards.

4. San Beda has maintained and sustained its standing as an academic institution. The awards and recognitions received by its members in the field of academics, sports, entertainment and government service are manifestations of the institution's and of every Bedan's commitment to excellence.

The journey to success seems endless, especially for an institution like San Beda that is set to outlast and outachieve. "We can say that we have realized our goal as a Catholic institution if we have produced graduates and formed our Bedan community, grounded in our Benedictine tradition of love of God, that start to take on the responsibility to discover and share knowledge in our society," Fr. Aloy emphasized. He believes that side by side academic excellence is values formation.

Coming full circle, the school administrators start again to envision another set of goals, that is, to regain the autonomy of the institution and turn its academic offerings into Center of Excellence and Center of Development. All these may take years for their fruition, but Fr. Aloy is certain that "If we have faith that God is in charge, he will accomplish our dreams!"





Mindful of these changes as well as its challenges and opportunities, the Office of the Rector-President organized a multi-sectoral strategic planning seminar on February 22 -25, 2017 with the theme, "San Beda University 2027: Fulfilling its Mission of Excellence in Education." It was held in the Montserrat Center of Religious Formation, Silang, Cavite.

For the very first time, parents, students, faculty, non-teaching personnel and alumni representatives were invited to collaborate with administrators in mapping San Beda's journey towards a university and an "academic community that transforms its members to become exemplary servant leaders, responsive and ethical researchers, conscientious stewards of creation and advocates of peace."

Atty. Emmanuel C. Magnaye and Atty. Stephanie M. Cas-Refina were the representatives of the parents of the Integrated Basic Education Department (IBED). Mr. Daniel Macaraeg represented the non-teaching personnel. While, Atty. Dominador Buhain represented the Alumni.

The faculty representatives were Dr. Jennifer T. Ramos (College of Arts and Sciences), Atty. Adrian F. Aumentado (College of Law), Dr. Ronald Alfonso Calma (College of Medicine), Mr. Pocholo R. Autencio (College of Nursing), Mr. Jade Reyes (IBED), and Ms. Michelle Gamatero (IBED).

The students were represented by Mr. Pricejoanmar Acob (GS Business), Mr. Mark Jason Vivas (GS Business), Fr. Jerome R. Sevilla (GS Liturgy), Ms. Katrisha Analine B. Kok (College of Law), Ms. Almira Cheska S. Guinto (College of Law), Ms. Pauline Mari F.

The emergence of borderless labor market, the growth of cross-border higher education, the increasing importance of research, the information and communication technological revolution, the ASEAN 2015 Integration, the K to 12 Basic Education Curriculum and the Typology for Higher Educational Institutions are some of the global, regional and local events that are continuously shaping the educational playing field in the Philippines.

As the Bedan community embarks on this new journey of endless possibilities, the participants did not only recognize challenges and identify strategic actions. They also renewed their firm commitment as a Benedictine Catholic institution to the Christian formation of the young and to the service of the Church and the Philippine society. They reaffirmed the one-vision that binds them together – a community that is fully human, wholly Christian, truly Filipino, and globally competitive. These renewal, commitment, and re-affirmation to its Benedictine Catholic Identity are the spirit that permeate the process and the outcomes of the planning activity.

To provide insight and inspiration, Catholic educators and leaders were invited as resource speakers.

Rev. Fr. Jose Ramon Villarin, S.J. of Ateneo de Manila University, shared his thoughts and experiences on "Leadership and Quality Assurance System in a University." Fr. Villarin emphasized in his sharing the critical role of leadership in ensuring the successful realization of the school's mission as well as the quality of resources and processes needed to make the system work in order to succeed. He cautioned on the tension between quality assurance and accomplishing the school's mission, stating that the former is necessary but not all sufficient to accomplish the mission. He emphasized, however, that in the school setting, quality assurance must be applied and observed in teaching, research and societal engagement.

His Eminence Luis Antonio G. Cardinal Tagle gave a talk and reflection on "The Mission of a Catholic University and Excellence in Education & Research." Cardinal Tagle shared his reflections on Catholic University based on Pope John Paul II's Apostolic Constitution "Ex Corde Ecclesiae." Quoting John Paul II's Apostolic Constitution, he stressed





that a Catholic University is "an academic community which, in a rigorous and critical fashion, assists in the protection and advancement of human dignity and of a cultural heritage through research, teaching and various services offered to the local, national and international communities."

A Catholic University must possess the following essential characteristics: (1) palpable Christian inspiration; (2) continuing reflection in the light of the Catholic faith upon the growing treasury of human knowledge, to which it seeks to contribute by its own research; (3) fidelity to the Christian message; and (4) institutional commitment to the service of the people, of God, and of the human family in their pilgrimage to the transcendental goals which gives meaning to life.

He also shared Pope Francis' expectations of a Catholic University. These are the humanization of education, the development of a culture of dialogue, and an education that fosters hope.

Other resource persons were also invited to share their knowledge and expertise on research, legal aspect of a university, and operational demands of a university.

Dr. Divine E. Edralin gave a talk on "Elevating and Sustaining a High Performing Research System in a University." She emphasized on fostering policies and procedure to nurture research capability and maximize research networks, collaborations and outputs. Atty. Ulpiano Sarmiento shared his expertise on the "Legal Framework of a University." The typology of higher education as well as the intricate legal notion of academic freedom were the focus of Atty. Sarmiento's sharing. Fr. Ranhilio C. Aquino expounded on the "Operational Demands of San Beda University" where he dwelt on the structural needs to make the day to day operations effective and efficient.

Meanwhile, Fr. Aloysius Ma. A. Maranan, O.S.B. gave a talk and reflection on "Leading Together, Working Together" as one Bedan family. Fr. Aloy reminded the participants of the purpose of the strategic planning and that is, to get better. To get better means to realize our own identity and mission without comparing ourselves to others. "We get better in leading and working together," he further stated. He explained that in strategic planning we are planting the seeds of excellence that will be reaped by the next

generation of Bedans. He thanked the participants for being a gift to the Bedan family.

Fr. Aloy explicated on the integration of Benedictine values, mission and vision as the foundation of the strategic planning. "As a community, we plan to realize these values, mission and vision, and the implementation of strategies must also be guided by the same values, mission and vision. Benedictine values, mission and vision must permeate in the campus as well as support all academic and non-academic activities," he said.

Guided by the insights, experiences and expertise shared by the resource speakers, the participants got back to work through a planning workshop. Organized into groups, they collectively discussed the changes, challenges and strategies for the 6 Key Areas of the San Beda University Strategic Plan: Academic Programs, Faculty, Linkages, Outreach, Research and Student & Academic Support Services. The outputs of the groups were presented to the whole body in a plenary session and later on consolidated to form San Beda's Strategic Plan.

The strategic planning seminar was capped by a pledge of commitment and fellowship where all participants articulated what they are willing to contribute for the realization of the school's vision and mission.

The Philippine Council for NGO Certification (PCNC) is duly designated by the Philippine government as an NGO accrediting body. Recently, it recognizes Tita Evasco-Branzuela, Ph.D. as one of its distinguished Evaluators, serving the Council with 13 solid years of accreditation expertise under her belt.

PCNC, a private voluntary, non-stock, non-profit corporation is a service organization, certifying non-profit organizations that meet the minimum criteria for financial management and accountability in the service to underprivileged Filipinos. Among these institutions are foundations, higher education institutions, hospitals, non-government organizations (NGOs), and others.

PCNC HONORS TITA EVASCO-BRANZUELA, Ph.D.

Dr. Branzuela, San Beda's Vice President for Linkages and International Affairs was conferred honor in 2009 for evaluating a minimum of 10 institutions, in 2012 for evaluating a minimum of 30 institutions, and in June 2017 for evaluating a minimum of 50 institutions. Notably, Dr. Branzuela has been her Team's Chair since 2004. Her flawless reputation and credibility in the Council also elevated her to the Chairmanship of the PCNC Election Board, a venerated body entrusted to facilitate the crucial selection of PCNC's Board of Trustees

Referring to the PDAF scam in the country, PCNC Chairman of the Board, Augusto Carpio III, said "The scandal that affected the NGO industry brought about by the misappropriation of government funds in 2013 continued to test

the reputation of the non-profit sector..."

"PCNC will continue the promotion of its certification as a seal of legitimacy, good governance, and organizational management and a proof of transparency and accountability of an organization," Carpio added. Thus, PCNC pursues the enhancement of effectivity of NGOs in the country towards greater accounta-



bility, a more solid credibility, and robust capability in providing services.

In a talk with Dr. Branzuela, she said, "I view PCNC as a real catalyst for national development. It is an effective partner of the government in ensuring that only efficient and effective NGOs are certified."

"I am most grateful to San Beda College Benedictine Educational Foundation, Inc. for making me part of its "birth" pains and for paving the way for me to be a PCNC evaluator, coach, and mentor. My sincerest appreciation to PCNC for having me as part of the volunteer evaluators' pool these past years," Dr. Branzuela closes.



Office of the Prefect of Student Athletes, the Office of the Prefect of Student Activities, and the Student Council of the College of Arts and Sciences held the 2017 Victory Celebration and Student-Athlete Awards Night last March 24, 2017 at the Plaza Montserrat, San Beda Manila. The activity is in recognition of the outstanding achievements of the Bedan athletes after winning the General Championships at the end of 92nd National Collegiate Athletic Association for both the Senior and Junior Divisions.

It is the school's second successive double overall championship after registering the same fate at the end of Season 91. The San Beda senior athletes won championships in basketball, chess, men's taekwondo, men's and women's swimming, football, and men's and women's soft tennis, while the junior athletes won in swimming and football. Overall, the Bedans registered 683 points in the Senior Division ahead of the 647 points of the College of Saint Benilde with the Junior athletes, amassing a total of 405 points edging out the 397.5 points of Arellano University.


The victory celebration started with a Thanksgiving Mass officiated by the Very Rev. Fr. Aloysius Ma. A. Maranan, O.S.B., Rector-President where he expressed the collective appreciation of the whole Bedan community to the outstanding achievements of the Bedan athletes. He reminded the Bedans to remain humble despite the numerous achievements and to strive to further improve their performance not only in the NCAA but also in the other arenas where they see action.

After the mass, the students proceeded to the St. Placid's Sports Complex for the unveiling of the historical marker that will serve as a testament and a reminder to everyone of the legacy of this batch of Bedan athletes. This was followed by the traditional lighting of the bonfire and the calling of the entire community to sing the alma mater hymn as a grand tribute to San Beda.

The night culminated with good food, good music, and revelry as the student athletes were feted to dinner and performances. The student athletes prepared routines and performances that further enliven the atmosphere. Certificates of recognition were also distributed to first-rate student athletes who exhibited outstanding achievements in academics, leadership, and community involvement. It was indeed a fun night for the Bedan athletes who continue to fight for the mighty Red school.

a need to firm up the country's legal infrastructure, blossomed a fertile soil for legal training. Owing to the regrettable mistakes of the Second World War, the local Benedictine community found a new role to play in the rebuilding of a beset nation. Former Rector Fr. Sergio Martinez, O.S.B., wasted no time and built from nothing what would be known today as the San Beda College of Law.

As the year 2018 approaches and the College hits closer to its 70th founding anniversary, it gets difficult not to realize the College has indeed come a long way. It has certainly taken its place among the best legal institutions in the country, and much of what it is today is based on the seven definitive decades that have come and gone.

Genesis

Even after the war, the Philippines found itself still in the middle of many quandaries—widespread rebellion, heavy economic burden, and political tensions from neighboring countries. To triumph over this difficult backdrop, fate led Fr. Martinez to another disciple of justice, Atty. Feliciano Jover Ledesma, who is equally determined spirit helped the College open its doors to the world. The College was formally breathed into life on July 1, 1948 with Ledesma as the very first dean.

During its formative years, the College persisted on a singular goal, "to produce good Christian and highly principled lawyers, mentally and spiritually equipped to take their places among real apostles of justice." To achieve this, the College's forefathers knew their only option was to start up with a powerhouse faculty. So they did. From its first original roster of teachers, composed only of about five to six persons, two members became Chief Justices of the Supreme Court—Prof. Roberto Concepcion and Prof. Felix Makasiar. It sure was a remarkable start to what would become a remarkable legacy of formidability.

Dean Ledesma, adamant in his ambition to put the College on the map, did more than run a school and teach. He put a premium on activities that increased learning and encouraged brotherhood among the students. The College hosted symposia to inspire civic-mindedness among students, incentivized organizations that simulated real-life structures, and patronized studentled debates that tackled every pressing issue back in the day. In 1950, he even initiated a radio program where Bedan law students played dramatic roles that revolved on contemporary social events. Decided to bridge the study of law closer to human nature, Dean Ledesma went as far as using drama as a vehicle for learning and formed in 1952 a drama guild called then The Bedan Barristers. Among the students who first participated in these activities were Renato de la Fuente, Ramon Mitra, Jr., and Augusto Sanchez. Judging from what became of these students later on in their lives, Dean Ledesma's vision truly paid off.

It may be said that the College's obsession with excellence easily traces itself back to these profound beginnings.

Lion's Lair

After being able to fully offer its four-year law program for the first time in 1952, the College hosted its first commencement exercises and opened its pedagogy up to the ultimate test—the bar examinations. In its very first attempt to send bar candidates, the College already registered a remarkable passing rate of 100%. This kicked off a streak that would remain at an all-time high. And while the bar exam is not the only measure of a law school's capability, this streak certainly catapulted the College to the prestige which it enjoys to this very day.

Not long after that 1952 feat, the College began its other well-known legacy—its long list of bar top-notchers. Bernardo Fernandez, who later became a Justice of the Sandiganbayan and the longest serving professor at the College, registered a score of 92.75% and placed fifth in the 1953 bar exam.

Without rest, the College achieved another milestone shortly after that by producing the 'topnotcher of all topnotchers.' In 1954, Florenz Regalado, who eventually succeeded Dean Ledesma as the patriarch of the College and became the first Bedan Supreme Court Justice, registered an unprecedented 96.7% score in 1954 bar exam. To this day, his score remains the highest score ever attained in the Philippine bar history.

San Beda College of Law held a very consistent record such that by 1962, it became known as the only private law school in the Philippines to produce three first placers and established a 100% passing record in the bar examinations for six consecutive years within a decade. The message the young College sent to the world was clear: excellence was its virtue. Quickly yet with an element of exactitude, the College became a lair for the lions that would lead the pride.

Its Place among the Real Apostles of Justice

Consistent with its objective of producing lawyers with Benedictine virtues, the College strived to maintain an approach that injects social awareness in its teachings. By encouraging intellectual discourse through debates, forums, and writings, the College quietly reared students who shaped

bed



not only the future of the school but of the entire nation.

The 60s marked an important decade in the life of the College. There developed more avenues for law students to invest their knowledge on law and civic principles in. Naturally, more organizations gained ground and through these organizations, the College proved itself to be more than just bar excellence. The San Beda Law Journal, The Bedan Barrister which evolved further into The Barrister, the Bar Operations and the Legal Aid Clinic were all founded around this time.

Fate or random circumstance, the students who composed these organizations and played key roles in their law student days were notably the same lawyers who assumed the bigger roles in society when they went out of law school. Spanning different regimes that included the dictatorship of Marcos and the revolutionary government of Aquino, the College produced key personalities who seemed to have started their paths to nation-building as early as their student days.

Ramon Mitra, former Speaker of the House of Representatives; Renito A.V. Saguisag, former senator; Avelino Cruz, drafter of the Freedom Constitution and founding partner of ACCRALAW; Raul Roco, former senator and education secretary; Augusto Sanchez, former agriculture secretary; Sixto Brillantes, former COMELEC chairman; Antonio Nachura, Jose Mendoza, Bienvenido Reyes, Justo Torres, and Antonio Martinez, all became Supreme Court justices, and of course, incumbent President Rodrigo Duterte are just few of the names that quickly come to mind when one tries to remember the many Bedans who have assumed vital positions in the life of the nation and taken 'their places among real apostles of justice'.

Co-chairs ALN's Council Meeting and Forms Another Bilateral Partnership

To sustain the growing momentum in globalizing the Institution, San Beda's Rector-President, Fr. Aloysius A. Ma. Maranan, O.S.B., pushes beyond national borders to engage partners within the bounds of existing memoranda of agreement.

In the 22nd council meeting of the ASEAN Learning Network (ALN) at the University of Bengkulu in Indonesia, where he seats as Vice Chair, he agreed to host the Executive Council Meeting in Manila, Philippines in December this year. The crucial meeting will coincide with the 1st ALN-SBC Social Enterprise for Economic Development (SEED) International Research Conference (1SEEDIC) spearheaded by San Beda's Linkages and International Affairs Office. "We are doing these for our stakeholders," Fr. Ma-

ranan said. "These kinds of activities facilitate the integration of global perspectives in academics, research, and outreach. We need them to be globally competitive," the visionary leader added.

One of the highlights of ALN's council meeting in Indonesia was the signing of the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between San Beda and University of Bengkulu (UNIB). UNIB is a 100-hectare public university in Indonesia with 15,000 students and 751 academic personnel.

The era of globalization requires emerging competencies for the mobility and acceptability of graduates in local and off-shore industries.

Among these sets of core competencies are communication, multi-cultural collaboration, digital literacy, creativity, innovation, critical thinking, and problem-solving. These are credible indicators that graduates are prepared for the increasingly complex life and work environments in the globalized 21st century.

The Social Enterprise for Economic Development (SEED) Program, a flagship project of the ASEAN Learning Network (ALN), is an ideal mechanism that develops these competencies. Member-universities of the ALN conduct the SEED Program in their own countries.

San Beda's SEED Program in the Philippines, continuously developed by the Linkages and International Affairs (LIA) Office since 2014, is robustly supported by a validated framework and scientific methodology that promotes knowledge generation and acquisition of 21st century skills. This feature gained the esteem of San Beda's partner-universities abroad setting an all-time high in terms of the number of participating institutions among ALN member-universities.

The program, annually held in Bauko, Mountain Province, generously provides off-campus cross-cultural experiences that enables local and international participants to advance in the application of research-based strategies, theories and principles resulting from their immersion with the vegetable farmers. The business plans, as concrete outputs, are presented to the local government of Bauko and other stakeholders for

support and possible financing.

The San Beda College Benedictine Educational Foundation, Inc. (SBC BEFI) was also instrumental in the conduct of SEED in the area since 2014.

Recently, another trail blazing development among ALN member-universities was accomplished by San Beda. The annual SEED Program, through LIA, was supplemented with a validated framework and outcomes-based methodology for Implementation and Monitoring Study of SEED participants from the College of Arts and Sciences. Regular follow-up activities are seen to monitor the implementation of recommendations and strategies contained in the business plans. Moreover, the follow-up activities are gradually aligned with San Beda's Extension Program, specifically the Business Clinic Program (BCP) and Health, Environment, Advocacies, Literacy and Spirituality (HEALS) Program thus rendering a comprehensive approach towards sustainability and development.

The local, regional and global security alerts deferred the annual SEED Program in Bauko, Mountain Province in 2017. However, the resilience of San Beda did not allow the full stoppage of the noble ideals of the Program. Regular Implementation and Monitoring Studies in Bauko were placed to ensure the delivery of expectations of San Beda's stakeholders through San Beda's BCP and HEALS

Part of the internationalization initiatives, San Beda is constantly visited by partners as well as other interested international institutions who wish to establish a partnership for possible academic, research, and community extension programs intended for faculty, staff, and students.

On January 25, 2017, Shandong University, China's Director of Admissions, Dr. Guo Changsheng, and Mr. Aaron Jed R. Mir visited San Beda for possible faculty and student exchange programs. Specifically, they expressed intention to partner and collaborate with San Beda on the possibility of a special study program/crash course for Shandong University Graduate students in the field of Law and Business. The meeting was facilitated through the Office of Linkages and International Affairs' (LIA) Vice-President, Dr. Tita Evasco-Branzuela, and was attended by Graduate of School of Business (GSB) and Registrar's Office to discuss the intention. "The developments brought

about by internationalization in higher education institutions truly open opportunities for cooperation among universities here and abroad. San Beda has been receiving proposals and actual visits from various institutions. Hence, the office is working closely with the different offices/departments/colleges in San Beda to ensure that internationalization programs and activities are considered in the drafting of agreement," Dr. Branzuela said.

For the period, four (4) partner universities came to visit San Beda again as part of the continuing agreement and partnership. Konan University, Japan had a visit on February 20, 2017 for educational and cultural engagement with the delegation comprised of eleven (11) students and professors, Director of Language Programs, Prof. Brent Jones, and Dean of Hirao School of Management, Prof. Corinne Boyles. The visit was highlighted with the lectures of Prof. Jones on "International Business of Konan University," and the talk of Dr. Leonardo Garcia of the Depart-

San Beda-Manila's Senior High School and College of Arts and Sciences' Department of Business Management and Entrepreneurship, together with the Management Society (MANSOC), actively participated in the abovementioned activi ties. The meeting which was attended by administrators and faculty specifically tackled on the mechanisms for exchanges involving faculty and students in the undergraduate and graduate school levels as well as e-colloquia conferences.

Universidad Catolica San Antonio de Murcia (UCAM), Spain also visited San Beda on June 8, 2017. Mr. Chan Wei Ti, Head for Asia, Middle East, and North Africa, and Miss Karina Kristine San Juan, Marketing and Institutional Relations for the Philippines, met with the graduate students and faculty from the College of Arts and Sciences. The visit was a regular campaign program of UCAM to universities on Graduate Program scholarship grants and other opportunities like exchange, internships. Notably, through the partnership of San Beda to UCAM, one CAS Economics graduate, Gene Gisete, was granted with a partial scholarship. Mr. Gisete graduated with the degree of Masters in European Studies in October 2016.



While at the University of Economics, the students listened to the talk of Dr. Ho Ngoc Phuong who presented "The Vietnamese Economy from Socialist to Capitalist System," which covers discussion on the Vietnam economy, government, infrastructure, environment, transportation, agriculture, tax and the relationship of Vietnam and the Philippines in all aspects. This was followed by a city tour in museums and churches, a visit to the famous Bitexco Financial Tower and a day tour in Mekong River and Chu Chi Tunnel.



This July, San Beda Manila and Fasttrack Solutions, Inc. – the first and only SAP Platinum Partner in the Philippines, forged a memorandum of agreement to implement the SAP Business One Academic Program for the A.Y. 2017-18. The agreement will allow the training of faculty members and students on SAP Business One/Enterprise Resource Planning Systems. San Beda's adoption of the SAP Education Package for its integration in accounting, business and IT courses has been much awaited. The specific course modules will be embedded in the regular subject course offerings in the 1st and 2nd semester, starting this A.Y. 2017-18.

The SAP Business One® is a powerful small business software for Enterprise Resource Planning (ERP). It was developed by SAP AG, a German company existing for 43 years and ranks 1st world-wide in ERP. SAP Business One is trusted by over 55,000 companies in 150 countries.

In the Philippines, it is currently being used by 70% of small and medium enterprises covering over 12 industries such as telecommunications, oil and gas, public/financial services, utilities, healthcare, real estate, transportation and media, consumer products, retail, automotive, services, and manufacturing. 

But in the midst of these beautiful attractions, three important religious sites stood outstanding: the Chapel of Our Lady of the **Medal** or Miraculous Chapelle Notre-Dame de la Médaille Miraculeuse where the Blessed Virgin Mary appeared to St. Catherine Labouré in 1830 and requested for the creation of the Medal which is now known as the Miraculous Medal; the Notre Dame Cathedral Paris or Notre Dame de Paris, the host to many religious events; and the Basilica of the Sacred Heart of Jesus Paris, commonly known as Sacré-Cœur at Montmartre is dedicated to the Sacred Heart of Jesus to remind people that God is a loving, kind, sympathetic and forgiving God.

In Italy

Travelling from France to Assisi took the pilgrims one plane ride which was 1 hour and 53 minutes long and a 6-7 hour-bus ride from Milan Airport in a 35 degrees Celsius temperature. In Assisi, three religious places were on the list of destinationthe Basilica of St. Mary of the Angels that houses the Porziuncola (little portion) which is considered as the most sacred for Franciscans. It is where the young Francis of Assisi realized his vocation and renounced the world to live in poverty and join the poor; the Church of Santa Chiara which is dedicated to and houses the uncorrupted body and relics of St. Clare, a friend and follower of St. Francis of Assisi; and the Papal Basilica



of Saint Francis of Assisi, one of the most important places of Christian pilgrimage in Italy where the remains of St. Francis were entombed.

Tracing the Footsteps of St. Benedict

For Bedans, St. Benedict is an important religious figure, for he established the *Rule* which became the foundation of the Benedictine education. His reverence to God and the kind of life he lived are worthy of emulation. To trace the places where he had been is a truly rich and humbling experience.

The journey started with St. Benedict's birthplace in Nurcia and his twin sister, St. Scholastica. Atop the birthplace of St. Benedict, the historic Basilica of St. Benedict It was unfortunately was built. largely hit by the earthquake last 2016 and is still under construction until today. However, the image of St. Benedict at the center of the town remained unharmed. The next visit was in the St. Benedict Monastery of Sacro Speco or the 'holy cave' in Subjaco which was built in a mountain cliff, overlooking beautiful scenery. This monastery enshrines the sacred cave where St. Benedict spent three years living a hermetic life after abandoning his noble life and before initiating the beginning of Western monasticism. The Bedan pilgrims also proceeded to the Abbey of Saint Scholastica or the Subjaco Abbey, the oldest monastery in the world which was also founded by Saint Benedict. Next was the Abbey in Monte Cassino, founded by St. Benedict on the ruins of a pagan site, the temple of Apollo. This is where he spent most of his years until his death and where he wrote the Benedictine Rule which became the found-







ing principle of western monasticism. Despite the number of times it was destroyed, its reconstructed form is home to beautiful gigantic sculptures of saints and popes, manuscripts, mosaics, and works. As the last destination, the group went to the Church of San Benedetto in Piscinula, a small church which was originally a 4th century villa belonging to the family of Anici, relatives of St. Benedict of Nurcia where St. Benedict lived while he was studying in Rome.

Other Pilgrimage Sites in Rome, Italy


After tracing St. Benedict's footsteps, the pilgrims roamed, discovered and gaped at the grandeur of Rome, manifested in the following: the Papal Archbasilica of St. John the Lateran, the ecumenical mother church of the Roman Catholic (the mother and the head of all churches in the city and the world); the St. Peter's Basilica, a major basilica in Vatican City built on the site where St. Peter - the apostle was crucified upside down and buried; the Saint Paul Basilica, built by Roman Emperor Constantine I over the grave of St. Paul; the Basilica of Saint Mary Major, the largest of the 26 churches in Rome dedicated to the Virgin Mary which was built on the apparition site of Virgin Mary at the Esquiline Hill; and the Basilica of San Crisogono, a simple and humble church that keeps a record of the miracle made by St. Benedict in a fresco as he heals a leper. An equally meaningful visit was experienced by pilgrims at the Scala Sancta or the Holy Stairs where Jesus stepped onto on his way to Pontius Pilate for his trial, the tomb of St. Peter and the St. Peter's Square where the Sunday Message and Blessing of Pope Francis were witnessed.

In Spain

On the 10th day of the pilgrimage, the group reached Spain with two most popular religious sites--- The Shrine of Our Lady of Montserrat and the Basilica and Expiatory Church of the Holy Family. The Shrine of Our Lady of Montserrat Spain is one of the most popular pilgrimage sites for visitors who wish to pray and honor the miraculous statue of the Black Madonna or the Black Virgin (La Moreneta in Spanish). The Our Lady of Montserrat is the patroness of San Beda, after whom the first abbey of the Benedictine Order in the Philippines was named. The Basílica i Temple Expiatori de la Sagrada Família or the Basilica and Expiatory Church of the Holy Family is a 135-year old giant basilica that is unfinished until now. It is one of the most popular works of Antoni Gaudi, the architect who is best known for his Catalan Modernism style of art.

In Portugal

In Lisbon, Portugal, four important pilgrimage sites were part of the itinerary. The **Jeronimos Monastery or the Monastery of** Hieronymites is built in honor of Vasco Da Gama and to give thanks to the Blessed Virgin Mary. Consequently, the tomb of Vasco Da Gama and other

figures in Portuguese history are placed inside the monastery. The **Santo Antonio or Saint Anthony of Padua church** is the birthplace of St. Anthony who is a popular and revered matchmaker, patron of the lost and found and protector of young brides. The **Shrine of Our Lady of Fatima in Lisbon, Portugal** hosts the Basilica of Our Lady of Fatima, the Monument of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, the 15 altars that are dedicated to the 15 mysteries of the rosary, the Chapel of Apparitions where the Blessed Virgin Mary showed herself to the three children, Lucia, Francisco and Jacinta, and the tombs of the young visionaries, Francisco Marto and Jacinta Marto who died in 1919 and 1920, respectively who were beatified in 2000. The **visit to the modest house of St. Francisco and Jacinta Marto and Sister Lucia in Aljustrel**, a small hamlet near Fatima, Portugal, concluded the journey.

Indeed, a simple and quiet prayerful life is what we all need amidst the noise and chaos of the world. The suffering, hunger, frustration, pain, and exhaustion that are experienced in any pilgrimage are sacrifices that lead to the understanding that all these are part of universal human experience that the saints and even Christ himself went through. If Jesus Christ embraced his cross of suffering, rejection, indignity and death, we too must accept them with joy in our heart.
